Message from the **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

It is my pleasure to present here Candlelight Annual Report for the year 2020. This report presents the main achievements, challenges and lessons learned in this reporting period.

The year 2020 was unique and with several remarkable challenges, particularly the outbreak of the deadly COVID-19 pandemic which was the first of its kind in modern history, desert locust infestation among other recurrent humanitarian crises induced by climate change and other shocks. These hugely impacted the livelihoods of many marginalized communities across the country.

In the same year, Candlelight has also done more towards building the resilience of the vulnerable and affected people; we have scaled up some projects and also strived to reach out to people in hard to reach areas who would have been left behind. Generally, we have supported communities with Cash, Food and Non Food Items, health and nutrition services, on-and-off farm agricultural support, water infrastructures rehabilitation, Technical and Vocational Education and Training, formal education, Economic empowerment (VSLAs, SHGs), environmental rehabilitation, gender and human rights support among others.

We have also made deliberate efforts for more inclusive programming, as we pay more attention to the challenges, biases and stereotypes

that undermine participation of certain groups in communities.

As the COVID-19 pandemic struck, the commitment of our partners and staff helped to reach out to the most vulnerable communities. We promptly initiated COVID-19 response programmes; raising awareness on prevention and control of the spread of the virus, distributed food, hygiene kits and personal protection equipment, supported small and daily income earners to maintain their income-generating activities among other interventions.

Additionally, as communities and households strive to rebuild and recover, Candlelight will be there to support them; strengthening and rebuilding livelihood sources upon which they are relying – mostly focusing on our core thematic areas including environment and livelihood to education, health, gender and protection. Candlelight will continue working with its several partners and government to prioritize spending on these critical needs of communities and households.

Finally, I am very grateful to the communities we work with, Candlelight staff and Volunteers, our donors and other partners and government who have enabled us to continue driving transformative change.

Students were educated and trained for both formal and non-formal education. A total of 901 students are from primary and secondary schools while 462 trainees are from VTCs and trained on Henna and Beautification, Welding, Plumbing, Tailoring, Cookery and Solid perfume (Uunsi making).

Environment and LIVELIHOOD

In the face of environmental degradation, climate change, conflict and changing livelihoods, fighting hunger is becoming a greater challenge than ever. Therefore, Candlelight works to ensure that Somaliland people have the food they need today, but also ensures that tomorrow's growing population will also be able to meet their needs. That is why Candlelight is promoting solutions that are sustainable and resilient to the impacts of climate changes. It is also the reason why Candlelight prioritized small-scale pastoral and agro pastoral farmers, who produce much of Somaliland's food.

Environment

During this reporting period, Candlelight successfully rehabilitated degraded farming & rangeland through construction of soil bunds, rehabilitation of irrigation channels. To date, a total of 52,200 linear meters of soil bunds covering

approximately 120 hectares of farming and rangeland including the irrigation channels were constructed or rehabilitated and reseeded through Cash for Work. Some of the rehabilitated rangelands were also reseeded with locally appropriate fodder seeds. Similarly, a total of 4,750 mangrove trees have been planted along Saylac sea shore for the purpose of improving the marine ecosystem and fish breeding pockets, and to reduce flooding of the coastal areas. Another 300 tree seedlings including *conocarpus lancifolius* suitable for providing shade were distributed and planted in residential and government offices in Saylac, Toqoshi and Lawyacado

In the villages of Godaweyn, Godayar, Suuqsade and Iskudar, 4,000 sisal seedlings have been planted at the project's established nursery. Moreover, 4,000 mature sisal seedlings have been transferred/ transplanted to the project beneficiaries.

Food Security and Livelihoods

Candlelight's efforts in this sector were directed towards improving household food security to highly vulnerable households, revitalizing the agro-livestock production capacity at households and community levels. Several interventions such as multi-purpose cash transfer, capacity building, on and off farm agro input support have been conducted.

Multi-Purpose Cash Transfers

In the wake of the recurrent droughts, desert locusts' invasion and other disasters the mostly vulnerable communities in Somaliland have increasingly relied on cash-based assistance to assist them to meet their basic needs. The purchase of better-quality food is leading to increased food security and diet quality.

In 2020, 1,746 households received multi-purpose cash transfers (Conditional and Unconditional) to cover their immediate food and nutrition needs. The Unconditional cash transfers mainly targeted highly vulnerable women, elderly and the sick while the conditional cash transfers targeted able bodied men and women who engaged in the rehabilitation of agricultural and pastoral lands, desilting of balis and irrigation canals to improve irrigation and other assets aiming to improve the regeneration of natural resources and agricultural production. Findings of the baseline assessments versus the Post Distribution Monitoring (PDM) revealed that there have been improvements in the beneficiaries' households' food consumption and coping strategies.

Village Savings and Loan Associations (VSLA) and Self Help Groups (SHGs)

As part of livelihood and socio economic support, the program supported the establishment and training of 17 VSLAs and SHGs (women small business groups /cooperatives) consisting of 25 male and 195 female. These were established in Awdal, Sool and

Sanag regions. The groups have been provided with trainings in basic record keeping, saving, basic business management among others. For the VSLAs, the women were provided with 350 USD each as startup grant.

Innovative Raised Bed Urban Gardening

As part of addressing the issue of food production and food security and alternative income at household level, Candlelight in collaboration with Somali Women Association based in Denmark implemented a pilot Urban Gardening Project. The

project was designed to improve food security among vulnerable women, children and other individuals with specific needs in Hargeisa. Altogether, 50 households (40 female, 10 male) were trained in urban gardening and also provided with a start-

up kit including Rain water harvesting gutter and raised bed/box, farming tools, seeds and water tanks which were installed on their houses. The project beneficiaries have been able to

produce vegetables including cabbages, onions, tomatoes etc. for their home consumption while some of them have been able to sell off the surplus to their neighboring households.

Capacity building and Agriculture input support for smallholder farmers

Candlelight has continued developing the capacities of households and small holder farmers in Climate change adaptation strategies, Climate Smart Agriculture (CSA), Urban farming techniques, Integrated Pest Management, Agri-business, sustainable soil management practices and sustainable use of water resources to

approximately 460 farmers. Technical support was also provided to regional and district agricultural authorities on desert locust control. Benefiting farmers were also supported with on and off farm agricultural inputs including tillage hours, assorted seeds (Onions, Tomatoes, Water melon, hot pepper, Maiz,, Sorghum and Cowpeas.)

One thresher machine (used to remove husks from the sorghum) has also been provided to at least 200 farmers (100 male and 100

female) in magaalo-cad village and this will help them in easing the tasks of threshing sorghum.

This has ensured that farmers shift from traditional way threshing sorghum from panicle on the ground or sack using beating with stick, reducing cost, labour and time to carry out different tasks including winnowing, sieving used to clean and separate dried sorghum (grains) from dirt and chaffs. This will ensure quality grains are produced, time and cost of labour used for threshing is also reduced. The thresher machine will also help agricultural cooperative to generate income from services they offer farmers in selecting preferred and improved variety grains and seed stocks.

Through the support provided to target farming households in Awdal, a dramatic increase in production of both maize and sorghum was measured against previous year as a result of constructed water reservoirs, rehabilitated irrigated channels,

timely distribution of drought resistant variety seeds and tools. Milk production (Camel milk) also increased significantly in Togdheer, Sool and southern part of Maroodijeex regions following the improved pastures in rehabilitated communal rangelands and government reserved aroori plateau in Togdheer opened for livestock.

Community Adaptation Plans (CAPs)/ Community Adaptive Villages (CAVs) is an approach used to support communities assess their vulnerability, identify and prioritize their problems, action planning at the community level and integration of these plans at the local government level, into local development planning. In 2020, communities in 13 villages were supported on development of Community Adaptation Plans and proposed interventions were fully implemented in 13 target villages

in Togdheer, Maroodi Jeex and Awdal regions of Somaliland. An evaluation of this intervention confirmed an improved capacity within communities to respond to

shocks but also raised concerns on community's' capacity to sustain such a system without the support of Candlelight or other external actors.

Livestock and Animal Production

Animal production makes a big contribution to the agricultural economy in Somaliland. However, the negative impacts on feed availability caused by drought and flooding have reduced livestock conditions and resilience to disease challenges. In responding to the challenges, Candlelight has trained 47 Community Animal health Workers (CAHWs), the majority of which were male with a few female. These were provided with a start-up set of veterinary medicines and equipment. Each set contained 10 items including hooper trimmer, Burdizo, Bolus Gun, -20litre spray pump, albendazole suspension and bolus, pen-streps, alamycine spray, Oxytetracycline, ivermectin, and disposable syringes. Also, animal farming

trainings have been conducted for 80 participants (60 male and 20 female) in magaalo-cad and other villages.

A total of 364 (224 male and 140 female) livestock keepers were trained in proper fodder Production and fodder balling skills. These were also provided with balling boxes and hand tools to help them in the fodder management, conservation and utilization especially during the times of scarcity.

Candlelight's support the delivery of water to focuses on marginalized and vulnerable communities to ensure increased access to water for domestic, livestock and other uses including agriculture. In 2020, Candlelight has supported approximately 1,755 households through its development and emergency water related support. Sub surface dams, shallow wells, berkerds and balis continue to be

the main options for community water supply and working together with the communities, regional and central government. Candlelight has constructed or rehabilitated 7 berkerds, 4 shallow wells and 3 dams across the different regions of Somaliland but most especially in the Eastern regions where water scarcity is a major problem.

Solar-powered water pumping systems have been found to be very cost effective and reliable. Candlelight with support from its partners has installed solar pumps on shallow wells and also extended water stands to the homesteads; thus making it easier for women to access water for household use. Solar pumping has also been used to irrigate farms in some of the communities, improving household food security and

incomes especially where cash crops are grown.

In order to ensure proper use and sustainability of the water resources, Candlelight has provided operation, management and maintenance trainings to the different Community Water Committees and also provided them with the necessary tools to so maintenance of the water resources especially in the case where water facilities are fitted with solar pumps.

Hygiene and Sanitation

To improve the hygiene and sanitation conditions and behavioral change in the target villages, numerous activities including cleaning campaigns, awareness raising through

community volunteers, posters, and vehicle mounted speakers were conducted as stand-alone interventions and as part of COVID-19 prevention activities.

Education and SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

Technical and Vocational Skills and Employment

A total of 462 trainees (54 male and 408 female) received vocational training in Henna and Beautification, Welding, Plumbing, Tailoring, Cookery and Solid perfume (Uunsi making). Trainings were held in the different Candlelight Vocational

Centers. In some of the projects, trainees received supplementary courses in basic business skills and literacy and numeracy courses. On completion, most of the trainees were supported with startup tools/ equipment and capital for small business.

In one of the trainings, trainees were enrolled into internship training for the trainees to further practice their skills to handle customers and improve their interpersonal skills. Trainees were also assisted in developing a business plan for competing in the Youth Grant organized by Sonyo, a National Youth

Organization. In the first round two teams from Candlelight center were among the five groups that succeeded the grant application each received \$2500 for their business; the groups were Bulsho Tailoring Design and Naqshadeeye welding workshop.

Candlelight supports and encourages staff capacity improvement. In 2020 Candlelight VTCs staff and center manager received TOT and managerial trainings organized by Candlelight partners including MoE, International Organization

and UN agencies. The trainings focused on Business training, Placement and employment promotion, Education management information system (EMIS), Intensive tailoring TOT training and Intensive English training.

Formal Education

Candlelight Primary and Secondary Schools

Candlelight has two primary schools; one in Burao and another one in Erigavo and a secondary school in Burao. The performance of Burco Secondary school is improving every year. In 2020, the secondary schools will qualify at least ten students in the Certificate of Secondary

Examination.

As part of extra curricula activities, Burao secondary organized a football tournament where the best players were presented with medals in a ceremony attended by the Director of sports in Togdheer region.

Furthermore, in 2020, Burao and Erigavo schools purchased buses to ease transport for students to and from the schools. The

schools are progressing well and increased of grade 1 enrollment to 46.6% and 42.96 in both Erigavo and Burao respectively.

Health and NUTRITION

Combatting Malnutrition

Malnutrition contributes to higher levels of stunting and threatens the lives of potentially thousands of children in Somaliland. In 2020, two mobile teams composing of two nurses and a midwife as well as 14 community volunteers were hired and deployed in target villages in Sool and Togdheer regions. Through the Community-Based Management of Acute Malnutrition (CMAM) approach the community volunteers and mobile health teams identified, screened and treated malnourished children within their communities. A total of 5,870 children under the age of 5 were screened for Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) and Moderate Acute Malnutrition (MAM), with 1,390 children

admitted in the Moderate Acute Malnutrition (MAM) program and 450 admitted in the Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) program. Also, 1,920 children under the age of 5 were immunized for Measles, TT. Over 1,00 PLW were supported with antenatal and postnatal care. 4,370 men, women and children have been treated for communicable diseases and minor ailments. A total of 317 mothers with severely malnutrition children in SAM were supported with 3 rounds of cash support to enable them buy food items for the household. Over 6000 people were provided with health and nutrition information through printed materials and distributed brochures, stickers, house to house visits in all villages

Gender and PROTECTION

Tackling Negative Social Norms

Negative social norms and practices, the weakness or absence of legal frameworks are strong drivers of violence against children and women and need to be countered to keep women and children safe from harm.

In 2020, Candlelight reached over 18,600 individuals with protection-related information through house to house visits, awareness raising sessions by community volunteers, campaigns and distribution of Information Education and Communication materials. A documentary film is produced for awareness raising purposes.

Candlelight has also engaged rural religious leaders in training

that enhances their knowledge of health and social consequences of FGM/C and in discussions with urban (often less conservative) religious leaders. Candlelight also continued engaging with university students in campaigning against FGM/C, particularly in social media campaigns and sessions on campuses. The Anti-FGM youth forums were created by trained university students in both Burao and Hargeisa have developed a conducive environment to inform the community, especially their classmates and respected universities about the deadly complications of FGM/C.

Also, 300 female beneficiaries were supported with dignity kits in four target villages in the Eastern regions of Somaliland. This was done to improve menstrual hygiene of the women and girls. The beneficiaries were

also oriented on better use of the kits which included reusable sanitary pads, bathing and washing soap, a hand held solar light, female underwear, a water bucket among others.

Emergency: HUMANITARIAN SUPPORT

Responding To Covid-19 Outbreak

In March 2020, the first case of COVID-19 was reported in Somaliland. Several Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) and regulations including hand washing, social distancing,

as well as closing all schools, banning gatherings and encouraging people to stay and work from home among others were instituted by the National COVID-19 taskforce.

In responding to the pandemic, over 20,000 hygiene kits containing basic hygiene items such as Ibriq, bucket, bathing and hand washing soaps, reusable masks were distributed to households most especially in the Eastern regions of Somaliland. Furthermore, 15 health facilities have been supported with hygiene and sanitation kits including hand washing soap, garbage cans, brooms for sweeping, cleaning

gloves, bleaching liquid, buckets for cleaning and moppers. In collaboration with the Ministry of Health, 200 health workers were trained in different aspects including the management of COVID-19 cases. Candlelight similarly distributed close to 100 hand washing stations and soap in strategic locations including schools, markets, health facilities, mosques among others. The COVID-19 related awareness continues to be spread across all

the target sites and integrated in all project activities. The awareness raising is done through use of radio messages,

IEC materials, vehicle mounted speakers, and Community Volunteers.




Beneficiary Feedback and Accountability MECHANISMS

Candlelight Beneficiary Feedback and Accountability

Candlelight operates a beneficiary feedback and accountability mechanism. In 2020, Candlelight received 121 feedback messages from both beneficiaries and non-beneficiaries over the organizational assistance across Somaliland six regions. 2% of the 121 cases from the feedback were positive, while 40% was request for assistance. 59% of the feedbacks were major dissatisfactions which arose as a result of delayed release of funds to Cash for Work beneficiaries in one of the projects. Those 121 cases of feedback that Candlelight has received were either hotline/ toll free line (2056) or face to face. 56%

of the feedback was received from male beneficiaries and 44% from female beneficiaries. In terms of age group, 94% of the beneficiaries were between 18-59 years old and the 6% are 60 years plus. More feedback from the project beneficiaries was received through Post Distribution Monitoring exercises and community meetings. Some of the feedback has been used to inform programme and project amendments in order to improve service delivery. The system has further strengthened the trust and relationship that the organization has with the communities.


